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### **Summer Rising:**

- Program expectations and experiences will be differentiated by grade level.
- Grades K-8: programs will be in-person and planned and operated collaboratively by school
  principals and community-based organizations. We will be opening more buildings
  this summer than in previous summers and all K-8 schools will be in buildings with DYCDfunded CBO partners. Enrollment will be open to any student who wants to participate and
  will not be limited to students with promotion in doubt or "mandated" students.
- High Schools will have flexibility to design programs that meet the needs of their school communities and are encouraged to seek student input in the planning process. High School programs may be in person or remote based on program area and community need.

### Perceived Stress Scale:

- District 19 has administered the Perceived Stress Scale to grades 3-8 in order to collect quantitative data on SEL program effectiveness.
- The assessment consisted of 10 multiple choice questions read aloud to students as they respond
  on a google form.
- The assessment will be administered quarterly.
- The scale measures scores as
  - low stress 0-13
  - Moderate stress 14-26
  - High perceived stress 27-40
- Schools created tiered intervention plans to support students at each level.
- The results will be received next week and disaggregated by subgroups such as
  - Remote vs in person
  - Gender,

## Student Empathy Conversations with High School students:

- Investment in technology.

### Guidance on Graduation and End- of-Year Activities:

- The DOE is in the process of formalizing guidance for schools to have graduation and moving-up ceremonies to celebrate their students at all levels, including 3-K, pre-K, and kindergarten moving-up ceremonies, as well as fifth-, eighth-, and twelfth-grade graduations. The DOE is committed to supporting schools in finding meaningful and creative ways to celebrate the class of 2021 in these unprecedented times.
- End-of-School Year Activities Guidance: To ensure the health and safety of all students and staff, at this time schools may arrange for in-person graduation pictures (for pre-K through grade 8 schools that are open; high



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school guidance is forthcoming), and explore opportunities for outdoor, in-person graduations and other virtual celebrations. Schools planning to hold outdoor, in-person graduations should also offer a virtual option for families and students. All graduation ceremonies and other end-of-year activities, including any graduation photography, are subject to strict adherence to Department of Health and Mental Hygiene (DOHMH) COVID-19 policies and the DOE's previously published guidelines.
